Spring is a great time to get out and do fun activities with your family! Sometimes it can be difficult to find sensory-friendly activities for your loved one. Sensory-friendly activities are catered to individuals who may struggle with being in loud or noisy places, and may have behaviors due to feeling overwhelmed. We found a few fun and interesting activities that you should check out with your loved one this spring! Daniel's Music Foundation: Activities for Adults with Disabilities https://www.danielsmusic.org

Free virtual music and movement activity videos that you can enjoy at your own pace and on your own schedule and they are for all ages and abilities.

• Free virtual live events that are free; Some of these events include dance parties for different ages and even open mic nights for performers. Creative Living Community of CT: Recreation & Social Events Farm to Table Dinner coming up July 15th (Coventry)

• They have recreation and social events for adults with Autism and other intellectual and developmental disabilities; including Yoga at the Farm or via Zoom, Bowling Nights, trips to Dave & Busters, social gatherings at their Coventry Farm, advocacy events, and other gatherings throughout the year.

- Additional sensory spaces outside of the theater such as coloring tables and quiet spaces are provided if individuals need a break during programming.







OT Intern Program Continued:

Arcade-loving kids can enjoy a quieter, less-crowded dining and entertainment environment, dimmed lighting, and a sensory-friendly arcade experience during Sensory Sensitive Sundays at the Manchester location on the first Sunday of every month from 9am to 11am. Mystic Aquarium: Sensory Friendly Evening (Mystic, CT)

• Every August, Mystic hosts a very popular (and free) sensory-friendly evening for children on the autism spectrum.

• Kids can explore all the usual aquatic exhibits, with sound and motion effects turned down or off. There are also quiet corners to allow children to take breaks and supportive staff on hand.



#### **UPDATES** for all:

- We have funded all of the construction and finishes to the sensory room, now we will be fundraising to get the hardware and software to put in to the room, about \$40,000 more and we are ready to provide quality sensory activities in a beautiful space.

- WE have created a 3 year plan for our busdiness, most of year one is tightening up on all of our processes and policies as well as increasing the way we sell and market the items created by our individuals.
